


Rust Removal

Ophthalmology



Introduction

This leaflet is intended for patients who have had a metal foreign body removed from the clear surface of the eye (cornea).

Why do I need rust removal?

A small piece of metal has been removed from the clear surface of your eye (cornea), leaving behind a ring of rust which must be removed.

What do I need to do now?

You will need to put the prescribed antibiotic eye ointment, into the eye, six times a day for the first week, then four times a day thereafter.

Why do I need to do this?

The ointment will soften the rust, so that it can be easily removed at your next appointment, and it may help prevent infection.

Do I need to take any precautions during this time?

The ointment is an oily substance which may cause blurring of vision. Therefore, you need to wait until your vision clears before driving, operating machinery etc.

The prevention of infection is a major priority in all healthcare and everyone has a part to play.

- Please decontaminate your hands frequently for 20 seconds using soap and water or alcohol gel if available
- If you have symptoms of diarrhoea and/or vomiting, cough or other respiratory symptoms, a temperature or any loss of taste or smell please do not visit the hospital or any other care facility and seek advice from 111
- Keep the environment clean and tidy
- Let's work together to keep infections out of our hospitals and care homes.

What happens if I do not have the rust removed?

There can be serious consequences if this is not removed, the eye may develop other problems. If you have any queries about this please discuss it with a member of staff.

What shall I do if I have any problems with my treatment?

If you have any problems putting your ointment in, please contact the department straight away.
