

C-Urea Breath Test

Gastroenterology - Day Case Unit

Introduction

Your Doctor has advised that you should have a test called a C-Urea Breath Test to look for the presence of Helicobacter pylori.

This procedure is undertaken in the Gastroenterology Day Case Unit which is currently in Cannock Chase Hospital. This leaflet tells you why you need the investigation, how to prepare for it and what to expect on the day and immediately afterwards.

What is Helicobacter Pylori?

Helicobacter pylori is a bacterium that can be found in the human stomach. It does not usually cause any harm, however, in some people it can lead to inflammation and ulcers in the stomach and duodenum (the first part of the small intestine).

How can I prepare for the test?

Certain medications can affect the result of the test:

- It is important that you do not take any antibiotics in the four weeks prior to your test
- You also need to avoid the following antacid drugs for at least two weeks prior to the procedure:

Lansoprazole, Esomeprazole, Omeprazole, Rabeprazole, Pantoprazole, Cimetidine, Ranitidine

If you are taking any of these medications please contact us on the number above so that we can advise you appropriately

 Please have nothing to eat or drink for six hours before your test.

Are there any side effects that I need to be aware of?

Urea is a harmless, naturally occurring substance in the body. It is unlikely that the urea substance will cause any side affects. Some patients have occasionally mentioned having a sour taste in the mouth. Stomach cramps, fatigue and distortion of sense of smell have also been reported by some patients.

Are there alternatives?

Blood tests and stool tests are alternative non-invasive tests but both of these tests are less reliable in the detection of Helicobacter pylori, especially after eradication treatment.

What is eradication treatment?

Eradication treatment is a medication treatment of H. pylori which usually involves a triple-therapy regimen (3 medications) comprising of a proton pump inhibitor (usually Lansoprazole or Omeprazole) and 2 antibacterials (Clarithromycin and Amoxicillin, or in cases of Penicillin allergy, Metronidazole).

What does the test involve?

You will be invited to come to the Gastroenterology Day Case Unit for your breath test.

The test starts with the collection of the baseline breath samples. You will be asked to breathe gently through the straw into two blue-capped breath sample containers.

You will then be asked to swallow a small tablet with half a glass of water.

After 10 minutes the tablet will have dissolved and then you will be asked to breathe into the red-capped breath sample containers.

Your samples will be sent away to a qualified laboratory where they will analyse the samples of breath and report the presence or absence of Helicobacter pylori.

How will I get the results?

The results will be sent to the hospital doctor in charge of your care. The doctor will then inform you and your GP of the result and advise on any further actions needed.
