

Bladder Pressure Studies (Urodynamics)

Gynaecology

Introduction

What is this leaflet for?

To help you to understand the investigation that has been arranged for you to help assess your bladder problem.

Please complete the bladder chart in the centre pages and bring to your appointment.

Please get a urine sample checked by your GP the week before your appointment as we can not do your test if you have a urine infection. Please change your appointment if you have an infection.

What is Urodynamics?

Urodynamics means the study of the pressure and flow in the bladder and tube through which you pass water (urethra). The test shows what is happening when the bladder is filling and emptying. This can be very helpful in assessing bladder problems or planning any necessary treatment.

Are all urodynamic investigations the same?

No, some urodynamic investigations use X-ray to take pictures of the bladder function (known as video urodynamics), others measure pressure only. Your consultant will have decided which test is appropriate for you.

Consent

We must seek your consent for any procedure or treatment beforehand. Your doctor will explain the risks, benefits and alternatives where relevant before they ask for your consent. If you are unsure about any aspect of the procedure or treatment proposed, please do not hesitate to ask for more information.

What are the benefits?

The procedure will help to assess the bladder problems that you are experiencing.

Are there any risks involved in having the treatment?

There are nearly always risks to any treatment. The main adverse effect of urodynamics is urinary infection which occurs in about 5% of patients (the risk is slightly higher in patients who have suffered infections in the past). This can be reduced significantly by drinking plenty of fluids for 48 hours following the procedure.

What happens before the Bladder Pressure Test?

Please eat and drink as normal, and please attend with a full bladder. If you are taking any medication for an over active bladder, please stop one week before your appointment. You may continue to take any other medication as you usually would.

Please notify us if you may be pregnant, as you will not be able to undergo any X-ray bladder pressure studies.

We will still be able to complete these investigations if you are menstruating (on a period).

One week before, you are required to complete the Bladder Chart which has been included as the end of the leaflet.

What happens on the day of the Bladder Pressure Test?

- You will be greeted by a member of staff and asked to pass urine. You will be asked to change into a gown and the details of the test will be explained to you. Your urine sample will be tested at this point
- The Consultant Urogynaecologist or nurse specialist will ask you about your bladder problem and symptoms

What will happen during the Bladder Pressure Test?

- You will be asked to lie on a couch or special X-ray table. Two very fine tubes are passed into the bladder. One tube measures bladder pressure and the other fills your bladder with sterile fluid

- A very fine tube will also be passed just inside your rectum (back passage) so that the pressure in the abdomen can be measured as the bladder fills and empties
- Once the tubes have been inserted, they will be attached to a special computer that will measure bladder activity
- The bladder is then gradually filled with fluid and you will be asked to indicate when you first want to pass urine and once again when you are full
- Once your bladder is full, you will again be asked to pass urine into the special toilet
- Once your bladder is empty, all the tubes will be removed and the computer will print out the results of your urodynamics investigation. The test is now finished
- The whole test usually takes up to 45 minutes

What happens after the Bladder Pressure Test?

- The results of your investigation and treatment plan will be fully discussed with you. Please feel free to ask the consultant or specialist nurse any questions you have about the test or possible treatments

Is there any advice following the bladder pressure test?

You may feel a little discomfort when you pass urine or pass a small amount of blood. It is, therefore, important to drink plenty of water, (about two litres) over the next 24-48 hours to help these symptoms. If symptoms persist contact your GP, as you may have a urine infection.

Please do not worry about the urodynamics investigation, everything will be explained both before and during the procedure and we do appreciate that you may be a little anxious.
